Introduction

Upper Des Moines Opportunity, Inc. (UDMO) was established in 1966 as one of Iowa's seventeen Community Action Agencies (CAA). It serves the people and communities of 12 Northwest and North Central Iowa counties: Buena Vista, Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, Hamilton, Humboldt, O'Brien, Osceola, Palo Alto, Pocahontas, Webster and Wright.

Overview and Purpose

The purpose of this Community Needs Assessment is to evaluate the findings and agency priorities in compliance with the requirements of the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) and to be able to meet the needs of low-income citizens in UDMO's service area with continued support, programming and services to get back to or achieve self-sufficiency.

The assessment, conducted every three years, provides an in-depth look at the needs in our service are, our client's needs, evaluation of the causes of poverty, conditions of poverty and how UDMO addresses various issues.

UDMO utilized a planning cycle base on the Results Oriented Management and Accountability (ROMA) framework, utilizing needs assessment data, program progress reports and other sources of information to understand community needs and explore ways to improve or expand existing programs or create new programs to alleviate or reduce poverty.

Summary and Key Findings

The top identified needs in UDMO's service area are:

- **Employment**
- Food/Nutrition/Basic Needs
- Housing
- Parent Support/Child Care/Youth Enrichment
- **Transportation**

While there are services available in some locations to address the needs, there is still a gap where individuals/families needs are not being met. Each household served by UDMO, has face at least one of the needs listed and while we do our best to meet the families emerging needs, resources are limited. Across the nation, families, children and minorities are in poverty at inordinate rates and the service are of UDMO is no different.

Approach

Upper Des Moines Opportunity, Inc.'s Director of Program Development, Compliance & Reporting is primarily responsible for the Community Needs Assessment; however, other Program Directors, administration staff, management staff and board members all worked collaboratively in completion of the assessment.



Members of the Community Assessment Team focused on the mission and strengths of Upper Des Moines Opportunity, Inc. and on the needs in its twelve county service area to have this assessment define a path for the agency as a whole, considering the impact on clients and the community; financial stability; organizational capacity building; and ongoing improvement in program service through analysis of agency goals and outcomes.

Process Used

For completion of this community needs assessment, many specific assessments were analyzed. Census data was accessed and compared by the nation, state, and local service area. We approached different areas of the community to gain their insights and knowledge on the needs, opinions and views of the communities UDMO serves.

Of the clients that Upper Des Moines Opportunity, Inc. serves, 11.4% were non-white, 4.5% were multirace, and 13.8% were over the age of 65. As you can see from the chart above, UDMO provides services to those in poverty, exceeding the state and nation's rate.

Also, different programs within UDMO serve different income guidelines, all with the common goal of assisting those in need and in poverty. Some of the income guidelines are above the poverty level listed from the U.S. Census Bureau.

Needs

Our clients and communities have several varying needs, as each situation is unique. This assessment does not encompass all of them, yet focuses on the key findings identified:

- Employment—Clients need living wage employment.
- Food/Nutrition/Basic Needs—Clients need resources for obtaining affordable and healthy foods.
- Housing Clients need safe and affordable housing.
- Parent Support/Child Care/Youth Enrichment—Clients need affordable child care. Lowincome children need access to affordable extra curricular activities.
- Transportation—Client need reliable, affordable and available transportation.

Conditions of Poverty Employment

Labor force, employment and unemployment data for each county is provided below. UDMO's service area experienced an average of 2.8 unemployment rate. Dickinson County had the highest rate at 3.7 with Osceola County having the lowest rate at 2.1. Also, according to our Client Needs Assessment Survey, 23% said they were unemployed. Also, 76% were seeking better employment, 30% were seeking assistance to get skills training for the job they want, and 19% were asking for assistance with job search skills such as interviewing and writing a resume.

Food

In Upper Des Moines Opportunity, Inc.'s Client Satisfaction Survey, 24% said they have unmet food and nutrition needs and 58.9% were enrolled in DHS"s Food Assistance Program (SNAP). When asking what nutritional needs they could use assistance with, 75% said getting food from food panties, 58% said they need assistance with having enough food at home and 27% could use assistance in learning how to stretch their food dollar.

with Food Insecurity



Housing

Our clients are in need of finding safe, affordable housing in UDMO's service area. Since our service area is predominately rural, finding housing units a struggle in and of itself and adding in affordable for low-income residents is even more of a need. According to our client needs assessment survey, 30% said they needed assistance with finding safe and affordable housing, 49% needed help with home repairs and 43% were seeking help with making their home more energy efficient.

Child Care/Parent Support/Youth Enrichment

According to our Client Needs Assessment Survey, 24% claimed to have unmet child care or child development needs with 65% needing assistance with finding affordable child care, 47% finding quality child care, and 44% needed child care in a convenient location.

Also, 53% claimed to need parent support assistance in setting goals and planning for their household, how to teach children in the household in their household more efficiently, and help children in their household cope with stress, depression or emotional issues. Another 40% said they were needing assistance with communication and setting boundaries with the teenage youth in their household.

Transportation

According to our Client Needs Assessment Survey, 22% claimed to have unmet transportation needs. 48% were needing help getting a dependable vehicle, 40% with repairing the vehicle, and 28% with needing assistance to get to and from appointments or to run errands.

Causes of Poverty

Employment

Clients need employment opportunities, especially is rural areas which makes up Upper Des Moines Opportunity Inc.'s service area. Causes behind clients needing jobs is the affordability of child care, affordability of rent, utilities and food, lack of education, need of increased skills, knowing where to apply, resume writing skills, having appropriate clothing, and equipment for employment. Many clients are working multiple lowwage jobs just to make ends meet.

UDMO's service area has some packing plants in a few of our communities, which is a good resource for many of our clients. But with being so rural, finding employment can be a struggle.

Food

Clients need food and resources for obtaining affordable and healthy foods. Some clients who don't earn enough, often times, choose to go without meals even though it is imperative because it supports normal growth, and reduces the risk of chronic diseases. Residents are also unaware of all of the resources in our communities who provide services, or don't have the time or transportation to get to food pantries.

Housing

Client need access to safe and affordable housing. Income based housing units are either scarce or full, so finding available units is also a struggle, especially in UDMO's rural service area. Clients who have safe housing, may not be able to afford the rent payments due to lack of employment, debt, or budgeting issues.

Child Care/Parent Support/Youth Enrichment

Families need affordable child care. Child Care in and of itself is a need in UDMO's service area and in the State of Iowa. All communities within UDMO are struggling to have enough child care providers/centers for children, often time leading one parent to have to stay home. This then is hard for families to make ends meet.

Families also need quality child care. Quality child care is essential in the development of young children. Child care providers may not know about the resources available to them through trainings and certifications to offer quality child care to their families.

Transportation

Clients need reliable, affordable and available transportation. There is not much for public transportation in our rural area, so clients without vehicles rely on family members or friends for rides. Vehicles can be expensive to obtain and maintain leading to the ongoing need for low-income clients.

Programs and Services

Each program department will utilize the agency-wide community needs assessment. The approach in utilizing the assessment allows each program to clearly understand where the needs are in our communities and how the program contributes to the mission of UDMO and meeting the need of low-income families and individuals.

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The Child & Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) covers eight of the twelve counties, including: Buena Vista, Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, O'Brien, Osceola, Palo Alto, and Pocahontas. The CACFP program provides financial reimbursements to childcare providers for serving nutritious meals to children in their care. Children learn proper

eating habits at a young age, encouraging healthy eating to last throughout their lifetime.

The *Family Development & Self-Sufficiency* **Program** (FaDSS) also covers eight of the twelve

Counties, including: Buena Vista, Emmet, Hamilton, Humboldt, Palo Alto, Pocahontas, Webster and Wright. FaDSS is a voluntary program for participants of the Family Investment Program (FIP). Certified Family Development Specialists help area families move toward individual growth, job retention and economic stability. The program is unique in that, in addition to established

program goals, families set their own goals and decide how much and how quickly they want to improve their lives.

Hand in Hand is a training and support service in Clay, Dickinson, O'Brien and Osceola counties. This program offers individualized consultation, technical assistance, and coaching for child care center staff, preschool teachers, and family child care providers.

Head Start and Early Head Start Programs were developed to provide children of low income families a comprehensive, family-centered, child development program to meet their educational, emotional, social, health, nutritional and psychological needs. Head Start is offer in Buena Vista, Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, O'Brien, Osceola, Palo Alto and Pocahontas counties with Early Head Start being offered in Buena Vista, Clay and Emmet. Some of the centers also offer WRAP Around Child Care which enables parents who are working to receive child care for their children that fits their routine workday schedule. The Head Start and Early Head Start Programs are governed by a 12-member Policy Council. Policy Council members are made up of parents whose children are in the program and community representatives. Policy Council meets on a monthly basis during the school year to oversee all aspects of the program and its requirements.

Upper Des Moines Opportunity, Inc. offers two housing assistance programs, depending on funding availability. The Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) is designed to assist people in quickly regaining stability in permanent housing after experiencing a housing crisis and/or homelessness. Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) provides homeless and low-income households with security and utility deposits and rent assistance. Both housing programs are available to families and individuals in all twelve counties of Buena Vista, Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, Hamilton, Humboldt, O'Brien, Osceola, Palo Alto, Pocahontas, Webster and Wright.

The *Kommunity, Involvement, Development and Support (K.I.D.S.)* program provides free, voluntary, inhome family support and parent education services to families with children 0-8. Families must reside in Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, O'Brien, Osceola, Palo Alto and Kossuth counties. Services include providing child development information and screenings, information regarding routines, tips for dealing with challenging behaviors, school ready activities, potty training, and other parenting challenges.

The *Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)* helps low-income homeowners and renters pay for a portion of their primary heating costs for the winter season. Applications for assistance are taken at each of the twelve Upper Des Moines Opportunity, Inc.'s outreach offices.

Self-Sufficiency Advocate for Individual Life Skills (SAIL) program is a voluntary self-sufficiency program that mirrors the structure of the FaDSS program. Family Support Coordinators help the families and individuals move toward individual growth and economic stability. The SAIL program is offered in Buena Vista, Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, Hamilton, Humboldt, O'Brien, Osceola, Palo Alto, Pocahontas, Webster and Wright counties

Each county in Upper Des Moines Opportunity, Inc.'s service area has an *Outreach* Office which offers a variety of services under one roof. Services may include education, nutrition, clothing, rent assistance, utility assistance, information, referrals, and more. Each office has highly trained outreach specialists who are familiar with resources pertaining to each county. This allows Upper Des Moines Opportunity, Inc. to best serve each family or individual that is facing a hardship or has emerging needs.

The *Weatherization Program* is a low-income energy efficiency program designed to make the homes of low-income families more energy efficient, reducing energy costs and increasing comfort. Weatherization staff members conduct health and safety inspections on all homes prior to weatherization. Weatherization measures may include adding insulation, caulking, sealing and weather-stripping doors and windows. The Weatherization program is available in Buena Vista, Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, Hamilton, Humboldt, O'Brien, Osceola, Palo Alto, Pocahontas, Webster and Wright. In 2019, Hancock, Cerro Gordo, Kossuth, Winnebago and Worth counties were added to UDMO's Weatherization service area.


The *Women, Infant and Children (WIC)* Program is recognized at the nation's premier public health nutrition program. WIC offers financial allotments that enable pregnant, postpartum or breastfeeding women, or parents of children age five and under to purchase healthy foods from WIC-approved vendors. Nutrition assessments and nutrition education is provided by license dieticians. WIC is offered in Buena Vista, Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, O'Brien, Osceola and Palo Alto Counties.






Population Below the Poverty Level, Percent by County, SAIPE 2019



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


Households Living Below the Poverty Level, Percent by Tract, ACS 2015-19
















Commuter Travel Patterns






Percent Population with No High School Diploma







Evictions







Free and Reduced Lunch Program

Free or reduced price lunches are served to qualifying students in families with income between under 185 percent (reduced price) or under 130% (free lunch) of the US federal poverty threshold as part of the federal National School Lunch Program (NSLP).

Out of 28,414 total public school students in the report area, 14,131 were eligible for the free or reduced price lunch program in the latest report year. This represents 49.7% of public school students, which is higher than the state average of 42.5%.







The chart below displays the percentage of the students in each eligibility category out of the total number of students eligible for free or reduced price lunch.




Households Receiving SNAP by Poverty Status (ACS)







Introduction

The Iowa Department of Human Rights – Division of Community Action Agencies (DCAA), in partnership with the Iowa Community Action Association (ICAA) and Iowa's 17 community action agencies, conducted a client needs assessment survey to collect information about the needs of community action agency clients.

This statewide report contains the survey and instructions that were developed and used by the community action agencies, and the data that was collected from the surveys.

The information in this statewide report will be considered by the community action agencies for planning, developing, and delivering agency programs and services to the low-income people that reside in their neighborhoods and communities.

Procedures

This project began in February 2018. A seven member committee consisting of four community action agency staff, two DCAA staff, and an ICAA staff person, were responsible for the survey design, instructions, and this statewide report.

The committee completed the design of the survey in April 2019. Prior to the final design, a draft was sent out for review and comment to all community action agency Executive Directors and agency CSBG staff. In May 2019, the survey and instructions were distributed to the community action agencies.

The committee used the SurveyMonkey.com online survey software for the project's data collection. In April 2019, the DCAA programmed a survey for each community action agency into the online software.

Each community action agency was responsible for managing the sampling and distribution of the survey in their agency's service area, and the collection of the survey responses. Agencies were expected to ensure a minimum of 250 surveys were completed and entered into SurveyMonkey by February 10, 2020.

The DCAA exported the survey data from SurveyMonkey.com to create this statewide report. This report was completed on February 14, 2020.

A number of questions in the survey were open-ended. For those questions, each client had the option of answering them by typing a response. Those responses were exported from SurveyMonkey.com and provided to each agency. The typed responses are not included in this report.

Introduction

The Iowa Department of Human Rights – Division of Community Action Agencies (DCAA), in partnership with the Iowa Community Action Association (ICAA) and Iowa's 17 community action agencies, conducted a study of community needs. The data and information for the study was collected by surveying the community action agencies' community partners and stakeholders.

This statewide report contains the survey and instructions (located in the appendix) that were used by the community action agencies, and the data that was collected from the surveys. The data presented in this report includes statewide totals as well as individual agency totals.

The information in this statewide report will be considered by Iowa's community action agencies for planning, developing, and prioritizing agency programs, services, and strategies for the low-income people that reside in their neighborhoods and communities.

Procedures

This project began in April 2016. A seven member committee consisting of four community action agency staff, two DCAA staff, and an ICAA staff person, were responsible for the survey design, instructions, and this statewide report.

The committee completed the design of the survey in March 2017. Prior to the final design, a draft was sent out for review and comment to all community action agency Executive Directors and their CSBG staff. In April 2017, the survey and instructions were distributed to the community action agencies. On April 12, 2017, agencies could begin distributing the survey to their community partners and stakeholders.

Each community action agency was responsible for managing the sampling and distribution of the survey in their agency's service area, and the collection of the survey responses. The agencies were asked to do their best to ensure a minimum of 225 completed surveys were inputted into the online survey software – SurveyMonkey.com – by October 13, 2017.

On October 20, 2017, the DCAA exported the data from SurveyMonkey.com to create this statewide report. This report was completed on November 1, 2017.

A number of questions in the survey were open-ended. For those questions, each community partner and stakeholder had the option of answering them by typing a response. Those responses were exported from SurveyMonkey.com and provided to each agency. The typed responses are not included in this report.

Introduction

The Iowa Department of Human Rights – Division of Community Action Agencies (DCAA), in partnership with the Iowa Community Action Association (ICAA) and Iowa's 17 community action agencies, conducted a community partner satisfaction survey. The data and information was collected by surveying the community action agencies' community partners and stakeholders.

This statewide report contains the survey and instructions (located in the appendix) that were used by the community action agencies, and the data that was collected. The data presented in this report includes statewide totals as well as individual agency totals.

The information in this statewide report will be considered by lowa's community action agencies for planning, developing, and delivering agency programs, services, and strategies.

Procedures

This project began in April 2016. A seven member committee consisting of four community action agency staff, two DCAA staff, and an ICAA staff person, were responsible for the survey design, instructions, and this statewide report.

The committee completed the design of the survey in March 2017. Prior to the final design, a draft was sent out for review and comment to all community action agency Executive Directors and their CSBG staff. In April 2017, the survey and instructions were distributed to the community action agencies. On April 12, 2017, agencies could begin distributing the survey to their community partners and stakeholders.

Each community action agency was responsible for managing the sampling and distribution of the survey in their agency's service area, and the collection of the survey responses. The committee decided to use the SurveyMonkey.com online survey software for the project's data collection.

On October 20, 2017, the DCAA exported the data from SurveyMonkey.com to create this statewide report. This report was completed on November 1, 2017.

The survey included one open-ended question. For that question, each community partner and stakeholder had the option of answering it by typing a response. Responses to that question were exported from SurveyMonkey.com and provided to each agency. Those responses are not included in this report.
